


## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY FROM OUR FOUNDER


No matter what happens in Haiti, HEI's partnership and program models continue to succeed. 2021 was an extremely stressful year for Jacmelians: a flood, severe food and fuel shortages, and skyrocketing inflation. The Covid-19 pandemic closed schools during the spring semester and forced us to temporarily suspend our job training programs. However, our students were able to attend school safely and reasonably regularly in the fall semester. The total number of children HEI now serves has grown from 152 to 208.

In Cayes–Jacmel, partner Fondation Jean Bellande Joseph (FJBJ) swiftly rebuilt after a hurricane flooded their compound, continuing to run our scholarship and weekly meal programs for 61 students. They also distributed emergency food kits that fed over 500 people for a month because floodwaters destroyed local crops. When schools reopened in August, they made sure our students took their final exams for 2020–2021 and proudly announced the graduation of 4 more students. Their retention rate was 100% and 97% of their students were promoted to the next grade– an astonishing achievement under the circumstances.

However, we were unable to obtain final reports from schools and parents in downtown Jacmel under the leadership of our former partner, Cercle Amis des Enfants en Situation Difficile (CASED). Consequently, HEI hired talented Peterson Jean-Pierre and his assistant, Eddysson Pierre, to consolidate that program with our outreach efforts in the Pasquette region into what is now the new Jacmel Scholarship Program. He has redesigned communications with participating schools and parents and increased our 2021–2022 enrollment from 89 to 143 students. We are pleased to report that these students are attending regularly and performing well in class.

Despite the instability in Haiti, we continue to see the impact of HEI and our partners in Jacmel, where our consistent and reliable distributions of food, tuition scholarships, uniforms, books and school supplies keep children and their families together and focused on the future.





HEI continues to be committed to efficiency, accountability, and transparency. As a result, we again achieved a 'Platinum' rating from GuideStar indicating our commitment to the highest level of transparency. For every dollar raised in 2021, we sent 84 cents to programs in Haiti.

### A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

2021 was a disastrous year for Haiti, widely reported in the American press. Kidnappings, rampant gang violence, a presidential assassination. Americans advised to leave. A 7.2 magnitude earthquake in August, a Covid pandemic with virtually no vaccines. Food insecurity widespread as gangs disrupted distribution. The Haitian economy in free fall, from a very low place. Refugees fleeing to North and South America. Essentially a failed state. Our students in Haiti need us now more than ever.

From an aid organization one can witness heartening aspects of the human spirit amidst the worst conditions. It is truly inspiring to see our students laugh and play like kids when they are fed and feel safe. They are focused on learning, not hunger, thanks to stability and hope that our donors and partners provide.

Haitian Educational Initiatives has a differentiated model that enables us to provide such stability in the face of widespread breakdown of civil order and public services. We work through committed local partners in the Jacmel (Southeast) region – not through governmental entities. We don't design our programs remotely from the United States: our Haitian partners are central to our planning process. They execute our programs and provide oversight and monitoring to ensure proper use of donor funds. In the United States, we benefit profoundly from the energy, ideas, and perspective of the Haitian-American members of our Board of Directors, all of whom know the Jacmel region well.

We've upgraded our team in Jacmel by bringing on board Peterson Jean-Pierre to oversee the administration of our programs for the children of downtown Jacmel and the mountain region of Pasquette. Peterson is a dynamic, university-educated young man associated with Jacmel Espressyon, an arts and vocational school in that city. In view of the growing number of children in the Jacmel program, Peterson is now assisted by Eddyson Pierre. Our program in the semi-rural area of Cayes-Jacmel continues to be ably led by Paul Brunet Joseph and his team.

These staff additions on-site in Haiti will reinforce our supervision not only of the children but also the proper use of our donor funds. And we remain very focused on ensuring our administrative costs are carefully budgeted to maximize the donor dollars that carry out our mission. All Board members are volunteers, and in 2021 HEI's administrative and fundraising expenses were 16% of our total cash outlays.

Speaking of dedicated volunteer work, our Treasurer Bill Duncan has retired from the Board after many years of providing wisdom and scrupulous financial oversight. We greatly appreciate his many contributions. Pending appointment of Bill's replacement, I have undertaken the role of acting Treasurer.

We are in Haiti for the long haul. In a country where 50% of children do not attend school, and 60% abandon school before the sixth grade, changing attitudes and expectations is a long-term process. In our eleven years of operation we've funded education for over 250 children with a 95% retention rate – half a generation. If we can keep a generation of kids in school, their own children will start from a different baseline. And the ripple effect through the broader community will be considerable.



Haiti's problems are manifold and deep-seated. As our nearby neighbor and fellow traveler along some important roads in our shared history, the country's stability is important to the United States. At Haitian Educational Initiatives we are taking a holistic problem-solving approach in one region with education, food and job training: essential building blocks necessary to envision a better future for Haiti.

We deeply appreciate the generosity of our donors who are at our side to bring hope and education to children in Jacmel, Haiti.



## Our Partners and Programs

We worked with two Haitian-led organizations, Fondation Jean Bellande Joseph (FJBJ) and Cercle Amis des Enfants en Situation Difficile (CASED) through August 2021. While we continue to partner with FJBJ in Cayes-Jacmel, in September we consolidated our activities in downtown Jacmel and nearby Pasquette into the Jacmel Scholarship Program, led by Peterson Jean-Pierre and Eddysson Pierre. As teachers, school administrators, and dedicated caregivers, our partners are excellent role models for the 208 children in our programs.

Fondation Jean Bellande Joseph (FJBJ), Cayes-Jacmel

The Joseph family foundation operates in the semi-rural village of Cayes-Jacmel, located about 15 minutes east of Jacmel. Led by Claude Saint Hilaire (President, right) and Paul Brunet Joseph (Director, below right), eight members of the Joseph family and their associates have provided leadership and important services to their community since 2007.FJBJ's 65 children (before four graduated this summer) primarily come from subsistence farming families in the mountain and coastal regions of Jacmel. This region suffers from food insecurity because of crop shortages and skyrocketing food costs. School closures due to the Covid-19 pandemic and political violence affected our programs in the spring of the 2020-2021 academic year, nevertheless, FJBJ was able to provide these services:



- Scholarships for 65 children to 19 area schools: These funds cover tuition, uniforms, backpacks, shoes, books and school supplies. FJBJ pays the fees, completes the paperwork, and oversees attendance and academic outcomes.
- Weekly meals for 65 children: For many, we supply the only cooked meal they eat all week. Good nutrition helps children resist disease and perform better in school. These children eat only a cornmeal mush augmented occasionally with a vegetable or fruit. FJBJ provides a meal of rice and beans, fried chicken or beef stew, and a vegetable or plantains with fruit juice.
- Emergency food kits for 65 students: FJBJ distributed rice, beans, spaghetti, bouillon and other staples to feed our students and their families (500 people) in November. This food helped impoverished families survive widespread food shortages and high prices in Haiti.
- Weekly computer literacy classes for 30 children aged 9-19 (when possible): Computers donated by Project Redwood allow students to learn Microsoft Word, Excel, and to use the Internet.

- Weekly needlework and dressmaking classes for children aged 9-19 (when possible): The garment industry has been a long tradition in Haiti and tailoring is a proud accomplishment. Our students learn sewing, embroidery, and crochet to prepare for anticipated new jobs in factories and sewing cooperatives. We also teach jewelry-making, bead curtain-making, and traditional crafts to children aged 3-8. Paper flower making for use in parades, weddings, and other celebrations is a popular industry in Haiti.
- Cooking and baking classes for children 9 19 (when possible): Students learn to cook basic meals and to bake the cookies, cakes, and other sweet treats they sell in the new bakery business launched in January. They have already started using their skills at home to improve their families' nutrition.
- Enhanced job training opportunities for secondary school students (when possible): Fuel shortages and lack of transportation prevented us from coordinating with local resources this year.

#### **Jacmel Scholarship Program**

HEI hired experienced administrator Peterson Jean-Pierre and his assistant, Eddysson Pierre, to transition our downtown and Pasquette area scholarship programs from Cercle Amis des Enfants en Situation Difficile (CASED) to our new Jacmel Scholarship Program. Peterson is a graduate of University of Haiti and is Director of Jakmel Ekspresyon, an arts and vocational school in downtown Jacmel. He also cofounded of two community programs: the Pasquette High School and an agricultural co-operative. Under his leadership, our enrollment has expanded by 40%, and communications with parents, teachers, and community resources have improved.




• Scholarships for 143 children to 45 local schools: As with FJBJ, these scholarship funds equip the children with everything they need to enroll in school.

## Our Financial Picture

HEI's programs in Haiti required additional resources in 2021 as our partners and the children under their care confronted daunting challenges. The destruction in southern Haiti caused by a M7.2 earthquake in August was followed in short order by devastating floods from ill-named Tropical Storm Grace. Widespread hunger ensued prompting the HEI Board to fund \$4,500 in disaster relief food kits for distribution to our children and their families. Our partners' facility in rural Cayes–Jacmel suffered considerable damage, prompting the Board to allocate a further \$1,500 for facility reconstruction.

Administrative expenses remained essentially flat as the Board remained vigilant in keeping such expenses at a minimum. Fundraising expenses increased to \$4,479 from a minimal level in 2020. The COVID pandemic prevented in-person fundraising events in 2020; that led the Board to experiment with a virtual, on-line special event that proved very successful, raising more than double the amount of donated funds compared to the prior year's April event. Notwithstanding the resumption of fundraising costs, our operating model continued to perform efficiently, whereby for every dollar spent in 2021, 84 cents went directly to programs in Haiti.

Fortunately, the increased expenditures caused largely by HEI's response to emergency requirements was met by a strong response by our donor community. We were particularly gratified by success of our new, virtual, special event model which will continue to be an important component of our outreach to donors in 2022.
